Building Season is Upon Us- by Ron Revelle

As we approach the 2012 Holiday Season, we are getting seriously into the second RC season as Bob Noll's lovely wife Lanny used to call it. If you are getting underway with a project, grab a camera and take a few photos of the progress you are making. Send them to me with a few notes on the project. There is less going on at the fields this time of year with Wallkill closed for the season. Some of us have managed to get a few flights in during October and also in November. But there will be plenty of space in the newsletter to cover your project.

In my own shop, my second Nieuport 17 is well underway. As most of you know, my first Balsa USA Nieuport bought the farm. It was a really nice flying plane and I have some great video of it in the air which was shot by Scott Stauffer of SKS Video Productions. While I was in the pit area with my plane at WOD Scott came by and asked if it was a new plane and asked me to let him know when I planned to fly it. As I approached the line to fly, Scott showed up with his camera and got some beautiful coverage of the plane in the air. After I landed, he came to the area where the MHRCS gang was set up and interviewed me and took some additional static shots of the Nieuport.

Obviously when the 21st Carl Haauger's Warbirds Over Delaware video was available I gave Scott a call to see if the shots of my plane ended up on the cutting floor of the editing department. I was surprised to have him tell me that it had not and in fact it was the first plane featured on the DVD. So I have some professional coverage of the plane that was.

A structural failure caused the plane's demise the week before Rhinebeck. During the third flight in preparation for Rhinebeck it appeared that a wing strut came lose and down she went. I wasn't as upset as you might expect. Disappointed for sure. I wanted to fly the Nieuport at Rhinebeck this year. But as I looked at the plane in its broken condition I recalled what Bill Cosby once said to his son on the Cosby Show. "I brought you into this world and I can take you out and make another on just like you!" And that is what I am doing this winter. I picked up the kit at Rhinebeck from Balsa USA and have it pretty well framed up now. I will use a couple of surviving parts from the first Nieuport. Both the horizontal stab and the flying rudder escaped injury. The rudder had a lot of stencil work on it so that will save some effort. This week I called in the order for solartex and an aluminum cowl. The second build goes along quite a bit faster and naturally

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beefing up the areas that I suspect caused the problem on the first Nieuport. I find that I am enjoying the building part of the hobby more these days.

What's my next project? That is still a toss up. I am leaning toward the Sopwith Camel when it comes out this next year. But I have not totally ruled out building the 1/3 scale Sopwith Pup. I love the way my 1/4 scale pup flies and it has served me well. In any event I still some time to make that decision. Anyway I have a 1/4 Balsa USA Cub that is ready for trim painting and I want to get that to the field this coming year. Now, a couple of photos of the Nieuport 17 # 2!



The Nieuport getting its tail skid. This is just the beginning of the process. On the first one, the tail skid built per plans was very easily knocked lose due to lateral pressure on it when the plane was turned on the runway. The whole structure is quite large so I beefed that one up with plywood side supports and a quarter square hardwood rail on both sides of the side supports for a larger footprint on the fuselage.



Here it is with the old flying stab attached and the old horizontal stab sitting on the fuselage. Fortunately on the first Nieuport I modified the attachment of the horizontal stab from gluing it on to using blind nuts and bolts.

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The wing struts are stained and I plan to varnish them next. The cabane struts are covered with aluminum tape that I got at Lowes.

• White Elephant Gift Exchange. Bring an RC or modeling related item worth between \$10 & \$20, gift wrapped. Each participant will get to choose a gift, and will proceed in random order.
